in this country. Right, yet things have already happened here. so

without any further interruptions from myself, I will start reading this to you.

Some of it, because he's basically on a forum and people are asking him questions,

and he replies, so it's kind of in that format. You'll notice sometimes I I may

repeat the same thing, like I didn't hear any answer to that, yes, and sometimes he clarifies and tells you,

well this is what was meant by when I said that, and he goes into further detail, even though it's the same question being asked.

So the gist of this whole thing... he says there are World lines so to

speak. That's what they call them, and that in the year 2036 they developed a machine device that can make you go

forward or backward in time. Except the further back you go in time, the less accurate it is  
3:29  
and since there are infinite World lines, basically infinite things happening,  
3:34  
for every positive decision you did in this world line, there's another you in another world line that did not do that  
3:41  
Decision, did the exact opposite, and so forth. He says there's even a world line, for example, where I'm not the time  
3:47  
Traveler, you're the time traveler, and you're coming back in the time and getting on the Forum and doing what I'm  
doing right now.

What he says is that there are no two timelines that are alike.

They are so extremely close, some of them, that you would not know the difference if you were on one and then  
went to the  
4:07  
other one because they are that close, but he says no matter what it seems like,  
4:13  
there's always a one to two percent Divergence in World lines maybe, and they said, well like can you  
4:19  
give us an example of something. And he said, well for example, a sports team that won a game  
4:26  
may not have won it in the other timeline or the other world line. Um so they asked him, well what, why are  
4:32  
you here with our world line? you know, this one, why did you come here? And he said, well his grandfather  
4:40  
worked for IBM and had a 5100 computer and one unique ability about that  
4:45  
computer, which is, which by the way, at the time he'd said this, nobody knew this,  
4:51  
he said it has a unique ability, it can read like three or four different  
4:57  
types of computer language. And this is a machine from like the 19... I don't know if it was the 60s or 70s,  
5:04  
and that was kind of a secret. So while this was happening and he was going  
5:09  
online telling people this, people were scrambling to find out, is that true? And I think it took them to the time he  
left,  
5:15  
I think, to finally contact someone who knew definitively at IBM and who said yep we  
5:21  
never released that information. There's no public information about that. But yes that's actually true that this  
computer they sold, the 5100, can do that. And it was critical for them to get this computer into the future.

I can't think of what the reason was at this point. Well, I know, because it could read different code, and because  
after what he calls end day, or nuclear day, world war three, a lot of stuff was wiped out.

So there's different language, computer language stuff that needed to be dealt with, and the 5100 could read it.

I think it's been a long time, so I'm kind of giving you a little foreword here because I already read this again last night, and it's like

Who could do that? Who could make this up in that fashion? And you'll

2036? In 2036 I live in Central Florida with my family and I'm currently stationed at

an army base in Tampa. I can tell you that must be MacDill Air Force Base, because I live here in Tampa.

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A World War in 2015 killed nearly 3 billion people. The people that survived

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grew closer together. Life is centered on the family and then the community. I cannot imagine living even a few hundred

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miles away from my parents. There is no large industrial complex creating masses of useless food and recreational items.

Food and livestock is grown and sold locally. People spend much more time reading and talking face to face.

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Religion is taken seriously, and everyone can multiply and divide in their heads.

How is your world line different from this one? someone asked him.

7:48

I would guess the temporal Divergence between this world line and my original World line is about one or two percent.

Of course the longer I am here, the larger that Divergence becomes from my

point of view. Next question: Are you drawn back to your world line of origin for any reason? Is

8:09

instability a problem for you? He says, I'm not sure what you mean by stable. If you mean mentally, there are

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many things that bother me here, but being with my parents right now on this world line – his parents – is important to

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me. Physically, the only thing really wrong is the number of colds I get. He happens

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to get more colds on this world line back in the past, because again, if he's

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from 2036, and he's here in 1990... I think it started in 1998? In 99, 2000, 2001, where he

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came, he goes on to explain that this machine takes a snapshot of the gravity in the Sun & the moon, things have to align in a certain way to affect that, which will

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affect that gravity, and it's it's getting the next best opportunity to leave and the only way

that can happen... he can't just leave when he wants. This particular gravity field has to be back the way it was or close to it, to where the machine will take him back. And he says, the funny thing is, even though he's going back to his world line,

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Why would I want to talk with you? Why don't you believe you have something interesting or worthwhile to say to someone in the future? Again he answers a bunch of questions... no the ice caps are not melting any faster

13:02

than they are now. There is also far less smog and Industrial Waste in 2036. You

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asked about the north polar ice pack. I never said the environment wasn't a problem. Doesn't water expand when it freezes? If

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the polar ice cap melted, wouldn't sea level go down? I don't know if there's enough ice for

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this to make a difference and I'm not an expert on global warming. Yes I realize people become hostile

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(it's another paragraph) yes, I realize people become hostile. I don't expect anyone to believe me and I have nothing

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to sell. I take no offense by it. Just out of curiosity, if you were a time traveler, what do you think it would take to get people to believe you? Next paragraph, I suppose we could agree that no particular era in history is famous for

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its development of humanity, but just once I would like to hear questions like *what is family like life*

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and we pray to God in churches. There are some differences you may be interested in. Religion is a major part of people's

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Life is much, next one, life is much more rural in the future, but high technology is used to communicate and travel.

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People raise a great deal of their own food and do more farm work.

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Compared to now, we do work long hours. After the war, my father made a living selling oranges up and down the

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coast of Florida, West Coast of Florida. My closest friend raises horses, and another works for a company that

maintains wireless internet nodes.

Let me scroll down, next one, life has changed so much over my lifetime that it's hard to pin down a normal day. When I was 13, I was a soldier. As a teenager, I helped my dad haul cargo. I went to college when I was 31, and I was recruited to time travel shortly after that. Again I suppose an average day in 2036 is like an average day on the farm.

Next one, yes there is a post office. The internet is still alive and well in the future. People spend more time talking

because life is more centered on the community. I've noticed the same type of effect here when the power goes off,

people tend, when he says here, he means here in our time, people tend to come out of their homes

and actually spend time with their neighbors. There is a lot more personal trust and less paranoia. Next one, when

16:36

I'm with my parents, I live in a community made up of tree houses. This is in the future on a large river in

16:42

Florida. The river floods sometimes and we have access to the gulf. Most of our neighbors make a living off the sea or in moving cargo by boat. Next, no new information on UFOs and aliens.

16:53

Someone, again he's answering a lot of different questions, one after the other, so unfortunately I don't have the questions

16:59

with it, so I only get his answers, no, no information, no new information on

17:05

UFOs and aliens. I find that an interesting subject myself. Personally I think UFOs might be time travelers with

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very sophisticated Distortion units, but that might be a bit wacky. I don't think it is, if this is true,

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that's probably the same technology he has, but more sophisticated. One of the biggest reasons why food

17:23

production is localized is because the environment is affected with disease and radiation. We are making huge strides and

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getting it cleaned up. Water is produced on a community level, and we do eat meat that we raise ourselves.

Yes genetic engineering is used, but it's like any other technology, it

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can be good and bad. One thing we did not want do was create more

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GMO seeds, hybrid seeds... what were people thinking?

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That's one of the times I got to stop. Year 2000. How much has Monsanto been in the

down and they're just fighting to put more GMOs, more GMOs, more GMOs.

This was never a problem back in 2000. It was barely on anyone's radar.

more hybrid seeds... what were people thinking? He said that, the last part, What were you Bozo's thinking? Mainly at Monsanto probably.

I am a Christian agnostic and the parentheses it says "host"

Parentheses, did he mean gnostic, because he said agnostic?

18:46

Maybe that's something new in the future. I don't know. He says, I do not believe faith alone is enough to get us back to

God. I am not sure what happens when we die, but I'm pretty sure it's not a walk in the park and they sit there! Someone asked him something about, are you guys doing any kind of space travel? or he said, we're

19:03

working on it again after World War III. It's not on the top of the priority list, I guess is

19:08

what he's saying. It's more about cleaning up the mess, living, you know staying away from

19:14

radiation. My greatest joy is selling for fun. I enjoy swimming, playing cards, reading,

19:19

playing games on the net and talking with people who live in other countries. As a community we celebrate much more

and have bonfires and dances. My hobby is sorting through old magazines and videos of life before the war.

After the war, early new communities gathered around the current universities. That's where the libraries were. I went to school at Fort UF, University of Florida, which is now called the University of Florida.

Not too much is different, except the military is a large part of people's life and we spent a spend a great deal

Most of our memories growing up are not fond. Life was very hard. Simple things make me

Happy, like hugging my mother and father. Yes we have cameras. More digital film is used like paintings are today. no hologram cameras though. Yes we have phones, but the service is

20:17

through the web. most power generation is localized. It amazes me how much power is wasted now. Yes solar is Big.

There is

20:25

thought that a singularity generator could also be used, but most people are against it.

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The simulator, Singularity generator, is a device in his time machine, is how

20:36

it really works, so that's what he was talking about. The elderly are highly revered and looked after on a community level and so

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are orphans. There is always something people can do no matter what. The idea of avoiding work is looked down on. Everyone

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pulls together to keep the community strong. Hats are more common in the future and

20:56

flashy colors are less common. Dress is much more functional, and we dress up whenever we get a chance. I have noticed

21:02

that no one in this timeline dresses for occasions even when they have the clothes. Why do people wear shorts to church?

21:11

We do not spend nearly the amount of time on our hair as people do now. Women like to wear their hair longer, and men

21:19

have it much shorter. Both sexes shave it off when they're in active military service.

21:28

Far less medical treatment in the future. Even though it's more advanced, people die when they know it's time to die. No, lasers, genetic medicine, and cloning organs are the obvious new text. **In the future,**

21:42

**the Constitution was changed after the war. We have five presidents that are voted**

21:48

**in and out on different term periods. The vice president is the president of the Senate, and they are voted separately.**

21:56

**We have cars, just not a whole bunch of them. there is public transportation from city to City.**

22:03

**Or... from City to City... If I could bring some material thing back to your time from 2036 it would be a copy of the new**

22:11

**U.S Constitution. That's interesting. If he could bring one**

22:18

thing back, is what the question was. If you could bring one thing back here to our time from the future, what would it be? And his answer is the new U.S Constitution,

22:31

which he does get into a little later and talks about how very little changed. They just had to basically apply the

22:37

damn thing with a couple subtle changes. That's the new constitution.

22:43

But again, year 2000, what, what would he be saying from the future to

22:51

people in the year 2000... I'm bringing back a new constitution. Department of Homeland Security - not

22:58

created yet. Patriot Act - not created. The National Defense authorization

23:06

act – nonsense, not created yet. The Patriot Act 2 - not created yet.

23:11

You follow me? Why would he say, of all the things he can bring back, why wouldn't he say I'd like to

23:18

bring back the new money we use,, or a new piece of technology, hey you talked

23:24

about this new organ and genetically engineered organs and stuff, that you, you know, cloning organs...

23:30

Nope, I want to bring back the new U.S Constitution.

23:36

Hell of a statement to make in the year 2000. What? You gotta throw it out there.

23:41

Can you explain what the purpose of time travel is on your world line. In 2036 a great deal of effort is going

23:48

into repairing our environment. I was sent to 1975 to get a computer system

23:54

and take it back to 2036. Time travel is not a secret in 2036 and I expect it

23:59

will become more common. **Why is time travel used right now?**

24:05

**It is used to get information or items that would be helpful in getting a post-world War III World back to a**

24:11

**normal condition. There are seven other time travelers in my unit.**

Where do Time Travelers go the most? He says right now, most of our practical missions are from 1960 to 1980.

There is

a great deal of research into later and future periods, but the farther you, go the lower the Divergence confidence of

24:32

the world line. So if he said, oh for example, I got to go back to 1930s Germany, you know, stop Hitler. Let's

24:40

just say because it's more than 30 or 40 years back, the world line changes drastically as you, as the time period gets further. So if you... let's for example, if he went back

24:53

to Hitler's time, 1930s, there may not be a Hitler okay? That whole history may not even exist. That's what he's saying.

Um, has cancer or Aids been cured yet? AIDS no. Cancer, some progress.

25:15

What would you say to any world leaders who might be reading this right now? He says, Revel in your confidence today because you will not win tomorrow.

25:28

Interesting comment in the year 2000, especially for Americans to hear that, it doesn't mean anything to us, but nowadays

25:35

when you see what the hell is going on in our government, NSA spying, Eric Holder, gun trafficking, I mean all this stuff,

25:43

Benghazi cover-up... Revel in your confidence today because you will not win tomorrow. Interesting comment.

25:55

Earlier you spoke about the patch you wear on your uniform. you said the spirals represented two paths one was

26:01

safe, and the other led to God. What does that mean? The safe way is the one calculated to

26:06

take you to a time where you want to go. The other path will take you to God, in other words, death.

26:12

What he says, both are equally accepted and anticipated before each trip.

26:20

What is music like in 2036? Most of the same music you enjoy is available on

26:26

Archive, however the days of Mega Stars playing multiple track studio produced music and lip syncing on a huge stage

26:33

are pretty much isolated to your time period, not in the future.

26:39

Like everything else, music is much less centralized. The general trend is away from computer generated music, you know,

26:47

beats and electronic type music, that's what he's saying. The trend is away from

26:52

computer generated music and more toward real people playing real Instruments. Music is much more of a personal experience. More people know how to read

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music and play together in small groups. What are the social prejudices in 2036?

27:06

He said, yeah, there are some, however, as odd as it may sound it serves a useful

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purpose in my time. First you must realize that your experiences with prejudice

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and mine are different. I would characterize the intolerance you have here

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as a result of your ignorance and fear. I have observed that people with unfounded and irrational fears about

their fellow man and this time have the luxury of not having their beliefs tested.  
27:37  
After the war much of the Prejudice you have now was Swept Away by simple necessity. People had to work and  
fight  
27:44  
together just to survive. This has a way of opening a person's eyes as to the value of fellow human

Beings. What difference does the color of a man's skin make when you are both fighting  
27:56  
against the same enemy to survive or find water or grow food? On my world line,  
28:01  
if a man doesn't pull his weight in the community, then we feel prejudiced towards him as a  
28:08  
burden to us. This feeling of Shame then makes him realize his responsibilities.  
28:14  
What is Healthcare like in 2036? you would probably not like it at all.  
28:19  
I would compare it to what you see in western movies. We do have hospitals, but there are more  
28:25  
family doctors and house calls as compared to what you are used to. There is no real organized Health Care.  
28:31  
If you get a serious disease, you die. This however has had a tendency to  
28:36  
strengthen the general genetic pool. Doctors are more concerned about things  
28:42  
like broken legs, snake bites, and delivering Healthy Babies. What is the entertainment history like  
28:48  
in 2036? Again, entertainment is less centralized. There are movies and TV, but  
28:54  
everything is distributed over the net, and more people produce their own shows. Let me stop for a second. Year  
2000.  
29:04  
There was no such thing, there wasn't even an idea of the word YouTube. YouTube was created in 2005.  
29:17  
Google bought it in 2006. And are there not an awful lot of people  
29:24  
doing their own shows on the web? You can turn on the computer and go on  
29:30  
the internet and watch all kinds of stuff, less time for the TV, especially nowadays every... year after  
29:37  
year it gets worse and worse for the TV, so this is so interesting for him to say  
29:43  
that everything is distributed over the net, internet, and more people  
29:49  
produce their own shows. Kind of like what I'm doing right now,  
29:54  
and I didn't get started till 2009 and 10. Um, where am I at? What is it like to  
30:03  
start from nothing and work your way up in 2036? Very easy! If you can work with  
30:08  
your hands and get along with other people, you will find work. You always find work. Could you travel in time to  
escape your  
30:14  
original World line? Would you be looked down on for that? From a physical standpoint, I suppose  
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that would work if you were trying to escape a natural disaster, but you must consider that trying to escape by time traveling has its own

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Problems. I'm not exactly sure what you mean by "look down on". Is there some sort of new world

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government in place by 2011. On my world line in 2011, the United

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States is in the middle of a civil war that has dramatic effects on most of the other Western governments.

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When you first started posting online, did you, did anyone believe you? I don't know if anyone believes me now, but you

must realize that I don't expect anyone to believe me. Or does it affect me one way or the other? I enjoy these

30:59

conversations too. What would you expect a time traveler to say or do in your time?

How far have computers and software progressed in 2036? Good question. I would

31:09

say the biggest difference is the in the reliability of the hardware and software. It absolutely amazes me how willing

31:16

people are here to accept computer and software failures on such a regular basis. I was very surprised to see how prolific

31:24

it is. You can look forward to very stringent manufacturing parameters and programming discipline in the future.

31:31

Think back to the early days of the computer and how much work and cleverness it took to fit those programs

31:36

into such small areas of memory. Has more and cheaper memory brought better programs? Or just more programs?

31:45

That's what he says. As far as technical specifics go, I'm afraid I cannot go into too much detail, however, I will tell you

that processor speed and memory size take dramatic leaps forward.

Who won the Super Bowl in 2001? I do not answer questions like this. Although I don't really know the motivation for the

is not very different than it is now. Yes we have money and credit cards, however like everything else, the monetary system

is decentralized banking, is based mostly around the

community structure, there are no multinational banking or

32:41

computerized economic systems, there are also no income taxes.

Interesting. Are radio location... are radio location

32:54

systems still used on livestock? RFID. Some of the larger Farm communities use

electronic markers and fences. I am not a farmer, so I don't have very many details about that.

Is the GPS system still in use in 2036? Oh yes. In fact, the unit I have with me

33:13

works here. I'm not sure why that surprises me. There are also a great many

33:19

Communications and Internet satellite systems. Do you still have an American flag? What does it look like in 2036?

33:26

Yes we still have the flag. There is a debate about changing it from 50 stars to five.

33:32

Reason being, remember that thing about five presidents are voted in, that's because there's five Regional areas of
