Unfortunately I don't have any with me. Even if I did, I'm sure they would be scrutinized.

Again we get back to the same question, if you were a time traveler, what would you do to establish your
credibility? What happens to... (some person's name)? Am i involved in time travel?

What of the armed resistance? I have no idea what happens to you in your future. There was a resistance on my
world line,

but their goal was to maintain power and control over other people. We killed most of them by 2020.

Are there still books in 2036? Yes books are still published. What do they look for when choosing
1:55
someone for a mission? Depending on the mission, time travelers are usually chosen for a specific
2:01
mission based on their ability to gain the cooperation of someone related to the goal
2:07
on the target world line. In my case, my grandfather was directly involved with the building and programming of the
2:12
IBM computer, the 5100 model. If a time traveler is bad and commits
2:18
murder or goes crazy, is there any way they can be recalled. He says there is a difference of
2:24
philosophy between us that should be clarified. Since i believe that all possible
2:30
outcomes and events are possible, probable, and certain, it is impossible to
2:35
assign goodness or badness to a person or situation on some other world line. I am an insane
2:41
time traveler causing destruction and death, while some other guy – he just says name
2:46

of so-and-so on this forum – chases me with his band of devoted followers, however
2:52
on this world line, I am not. Since both events are certain, their value is neutral. It's kind of like
2:58
the ying and the yang. I'm saying that, not him. You can only
3:04
assign goodness and badness to the events and experiences you have direct control over or witness.
3:10
Only actions are good and bad, not people or things. I suppose if i was a psychotic
3:17
killer, I could accomplish my mission, avoid capture, and still return to my world line of origin
3:22
without penalty. There would be no way for them to know what happened. However, I believe that action is wrong
and i would be
3:28
accountable to my god. How do you know our world line and yours will follow the same path?
3:37
And he says, the world line, this world line, and my own are almost exactly alike.
3:43
Why don't you give us more detailed information about the future so we won't be so skeptical?
3:48
He says, I think skepticism is a good thing and no one should lose it. You should still give us details about
3:54
the future that wouldn't harm anyone and still add to your credibility. Again I do not ask or seek to add to my
4:01
credibility. There is no point to it. Actually by providing information that was useful,
4:06
I would be adding to your collective fear that I am real. In that case, this cycle we are in
4:12
concerning truth only spirals and gets worse. Why can't you name the five presidents
4:18
you have in your time? He says, over the past few postings, I have tried to describe the limits of what I will talk
about and why.

Here is a short recap list. In the future postings, I will place the following number next to each
4:30
question as to why i will not discuss it. **Number One** i will not disclose any information
4:36
that will cause someone to personally gain by its knowledge. This means no stock or sports tips. **Two** I will not
disclose any detailed
4:42
information that would allow someone to avoid death by probability. This means no earthquake or bombing
4:47
Information. **Three** I will not disclose any information that may compromise any future actions by individuals, or
threaten their family and well-being.

He says, on my world line, we are no longer afraid of the NWO, new world order, and he says, Are you
5:04
afraid of nazis? The reason the job of president was split into an office of five has four
5:11
main reasons. With five presidents, foreign policy is more consistent, power shifting between parties has less
5:17
of an impact on overall government, individual strengths between presidents add to the strength of the overall
5:24
office, and one president is elected for each major area in the United States.
5:30
So they ask him, what is the extent of the presidential power in 2036? He says the office of president is far
5:37

more diluted and centralized than it is here. The powers of the national government are more defined and reside more at the

5:43

county and state levels. They ask him, what is the new government like in 2036 compared

5:49

to the current one? He says, I think the new government is good, however since the concept of

5:54

nationally subsidized welfare is gone most people here

5:59

on this world line may not appreciate it. Let me stop for a second. He thinks the

6:06

new government is good, however since the concept of nationally subsidized welfare is now gone in his

6:12

world line, no more welfare, no more handouts, most people here may not appreciate it.

So again as I've said 40 times now, going back to the year 2000, I don't have the statistics in front of

me of people on, for example, food stamps. That's a different number than welfare per se, but at the same time anyone on

6:31

welfare is absolutely getting food stamps. I mean it's almost hand in hand.

Considering in 2008, eight years after this speech he gave here,

we had 25 million people on food stamps, and a mere five years later, we have like 50 plus now million.

It has doubled in five years. That line makes a hell of a lot more

sense now than it ever would have in the year 2000. Again interesting comment. Uh where is the U.S.

capitol? The new U.S. capitol... the new U.S. capitol is in Omaha Nebraska, and the story goes on, by

the way, where he told his people, his parents now, on this world line,

be the worst place ever, that's not why, just that being in Nebraska according to him was better.

it possible to send a message through time? Unless the information physically

8:24

travels with the person, none that I'm aware of. If you are from the future, then you should know

8:30

what happens to so-and-so, and they don't list his name. Am i involved in time travel? He says, this is the only question i

found from your postings that you could be referring to. Again I have no knowledge of you in any possible

future nor would I comment on it if I did. As far as a photograph of me in a

cooler across the globe. So that's another thing I want to talk

about. There's a little web bot update, very small, it's not really a web update more than it's close to a wujo thing.

I'll talk about that in another video where he discusses a brutal cold winter

10:37

coming, but the farmer's almanac is also saying a cold winter's coming.

17:50
held in 2020 to officially scrap the constitution and start over. Fortunately this exercise in anger

the Cray a rather large system? Uh the computer he's talking about, we need something

Portable. The 5100 isn't required for its reliability, it's needed to translate between APL,
18:58
Unix, and a few obscure IBM mainframe languages. The fishing is great and you're more
19:04
than welcome to join us, but the me here is only three years old. I'll have to tell them you're coming.
19:12
A lot... you'll notice when he comes, when it comes time for citizen's rights, how much of a
19:19
sheeple we are, how we don't look at the rights we have, we don't care about the constitution that's trampled on.

When he gets on that, he's very passionate about what he has to say and gives a lot of detail about the
19:30
future of (it) and how important it is for the citizens to get taught
19:36
and learn and know about their rights in the constitution. Again why does he have to bring that kind of
19:43
thing up if you're from the future? Why bring anything up about government and politics
19:48

who screw, screw, that tell us about flying saucers, and you know, particle degenerators that can

regenerate you across the world, and you know, like the movie *The Fly*, you know.

And that's nothing about what he talks about. It's all about your your

welfare state, you sucking the teeth off the government, the government's corrupt, they're the enemy.

You know, in the year 2000, most people would be looking around saying, hey this is still the

great American democracy, right? Back then, and what were we in debt, about five trillion? Four trillion dollars
maybe? Something like that. Hey not anymore! So continuing on,

Can you give us some personal stories of your past. He says, **I was born in 1998, so I do share**

That convinced my father to leave the city. From the age of eight to twelve, we lived

away from the cities and spent most of our time in a farm community with other families, avoiding conflict with the
federal police.

Federal police. That's funny because a lot of times when dictators take over they have a federal
21:32
police force established. Do we have one? The
21:38
Department of Homeland Security! There we go! Federal... we already got that and they were established after this
guy left,
21:45
right after he left as a matter of fact. Imagine that! It's incredible! So they stayed in a farming community
21:51
with other families, avoiding conflict with the federal police and national guard. By that time, it was pretty clear that
we were not
21:58
going back to what we had, and the division between the cities and the country was well defined.
22:05
My father made a living by putting together 12-volt electrical systems and sailing commodities up and down the
22:10
coast of Florida. I spent most of my time helping him. Outright open fighting was common by
22:16
then and I joined a shotgun infantry unit in 2011. I served with the Fighting
22:21
Diamondbacks for about four years. Hearing in my right ear isn't as good as I would like it. The civil war ended in
2015
22:29
when Russia attacked the U.S cities who are (he parentheses) our enemy. U.S cities were
22:36
his enemy, so keep in mind he just made a comment. By that time, when he lived out in the
22:43

Country, by that time it was pretty clear that we were not going back to the city. What we had there and the division between the cities and

22:50

the country was well defined. So he says then the civil war ended in 2015.

22:58

The civil war ended in 2015 when Russia attacked the U.S cities,

23:06

our enemy. He says the U.S cities... uh, and he continues, all right, let me

23:13

just read. **The civil war ended in 2015 when Russia attacked the U.S cities, our enemy China and Europe.** As unusual

and as bad as my childhood might seem, I would not trade it for anything. Africa is not a pleasant place to be in

23:29

2036, although I would characterize it as recovering. The music you enjoy now is quite popular

23:34

and available, it's just not produced anywhere in anywhere near the same amount. There is a revival of local

23:40

and classical music. Many people have learned to play their own instrument. I personally enjoy big band, some

23:47

classical, and interesting lyrical pieces from the 70s and 80s, 1970s and 1980s.

Yes we still have football, and you will easily recognize it in 2036. Yes there are significant advances in

23:58

computer science. It's interesting how easy it is to be fixated on the machine itself without

24:03

any curiosity about many of the support systems. This is not really big news, but "if

24:09

then" is out and "if then maybe" is in.

24:17

Yes I am with the 'me' on this world line and he is three years old now. I find that fact to be rather hard for

24:22

people to get along with so i don't bring it up directly. This is the second time I have, quote 'met

24:28

myself.' The machine, time machine, is owned by the military. I am part of a unit stationed

24:33

in Tampa Florida. The real energy is in creating the machine, not operating it

24:38

It's interesting you should bring up the divergence percentage. In other words how

24:44

much of a divergence between world lines there are. You may find it entertainingly

24:50

interesting to know that the divergence can be more accurate with more sensitive gravity sensors and clocks

24:55

in the c206. Now remember his unit is the c204. The c206 uses six CCM clocks.

25:03

His uses four in an active method of timing the changes in the atom.

25:09

We time travel to solve problems. A great deal of effort is going into repairing the environment and infrastructure.

25:15

Now back to that one thing, he said this is really not big news regarding computers and software but "if then" is out and "if then maybe" is in.

25:23

Now I do a little bit of database programming, uh Microsoft access with the SQL backend. I

25:31

do Visual Basic for applications programming, and there's quite a bit of "if then" statements that I have to use.

25:37

I'll give you an example of what he may be meaning here. "If then" is where we're at nowadays. In

the future he's saying there's an additional one, "if then" or "maybe" is a is a another option.

Let's say you have three check boxes on a on a page and you want to check a box, like on a form, right? Check box one, check box two,

check box three... you can put code behind the check box, basically I'm gonna talk in layman's

26:01
terms to make this easy to understand and you could say, If check box one

26:06
is checked or is true, it... again layman's terms... if check box one is checked, then... there's

26:13
the "if then"... then do something. Do uh print the following message right?

26:18
Hello. You press, you click check box one, hit okay, right. So you just wrote some code "if

26:24
then" ...if the checkbox is checked, then spit out this message. That's it. You

26:29
could do a lot more than that, but that's just an example. What he's saying is that's there, but now

26:35
you may not have an "if then" you may say if check box one

26:41
is checked, then do this or maybe do this, whereas now it's either one or

26:48
the other. There's an else statement, if checkbox one is checked

26:53
then do this or else do this. In other words, you know, raise your hand or don't raise

27:00
your hand that's the only two options. He's saying there's going to be a "maybe" and the computer software will actually

27:05
figure out the maybe, and and one time it may not do it, another time it might do it.

27:10
That's where the "maybe" comes in, and I guess the computer is going to have its own kind of logic that can figure it out.

27:16
That's my interpretation for you. Okay moving on.

27:21
Um who wins the sporting event for the next 20 years. I don't know. Even if I did, you could

27:26
stop the horse anyway and make it untrue. Number two, who will be elected president

27:32
for the next 20 years. He says, please see his other response where I'm not going to talk about that. Please tell me if the price of gold

27:39
please tell me the price of gold for the last 20 years. Man, I wish he would have answered this

27:45
one. I don't understand the importance of this type of information. Please tell me your opinion, why this is

27:51
interesting and worth remembering for 30 years? And again, after a civil war, after World

27:57
War III, rebuilding society, why would the price of gold matter, especially now in our society that he

28:04
kind of wants to spit on. I really do wish he would have said something though.

Uh five, will it still be lawful for me to own handguns? In his reply little sarcasm.

28:17
I thought owning a handgun was legal in the united states. Yes being familiar with firearms along

28:23
with other responsibilities of the constitution becomes an important part of people's
28:28
lives in 30 years. Is Korea united? I guess you could say
28:35
that Taiwan, Japan, and Korea were all forcefully annexed before end day,
28:40
and I believe it was China that kind of forced them to be pals again. Hey! We got to fight the world now, you know?
We're all Asian.

Let's handle business. I don't remember a great deal about media coverage during the civil
28:53
conflicts. I would probably characterize it in the same way you see coverage of Waco,
28:59
Ruby Ridge, and Elian Gonzalez. That's interesting, and that's kind of
29:06
like what we see today on YouTube. Dairy farmer, organic farmer – swat raid.
29:13
Guy didn't pay his parking tickets – swat raid. You follow me? That's becoming more and
29:20
more common. So again, one hell of a statement to say here in the year 2000.
29:27
From my point of view, yes this is an alternative timeline. From your point of view no.
29:32
And again I don't know what question he was just asked there, answered Australia is sort of interesting in what
29:37
is unknown. After the war they were not very cooperative or friendly. Can't blame them really. It is
29:44
known that they did repulse a Chinese invasion, and most of their cities were hit. They had a... they have a trading
29:50
relationship with the U.S. but I would characterize them as reclusive and ticked off. After reading the
29:56
questions I want to paint a picture that may help with the general theme of our collective experience in 2036.

The war had a very profound... the war had very profound effects on people
30:07
and how they relate to each other as individuals. Almost everyone in 2036 is very familiar with

death. We all have stories of loved ones that have died from disease,

difference is in the concept of good and evil. With multiple worlds come multiple decisions and outcomesFor
30:55
every good act there is an equal and opposite bad act on another world line. Taken to the extreme this
31:01
must mean that in god's eyes there is no total good and total bad in the superverse.

It balances itself out into infinity. I believe we are judged on the decisions we make as individuals, and the good
31:14

slash evil I see on my world line is an illusion that has no worth to god.

31:20

My reaction to it is what's important to god. Although this may seem rather heartless, it does allow me to see past the evil

31:26

that people do and acknowledge the core of potential goodness inside them.

31:32

We do not live in a racist society, but definitely a prejudiced one. Everyone carries their own water.

31:40

Our government looks very much like yours. It is a representative republic. My definition of a patriot is anyone who

31:47

defends the constitution against all enemies foreign and domestic. Religion has become
